#### Canada Post Mailbox

### Home Safety Review - Part 2 FIRE SAFETY

Further to the article in our April newsletter, here are more hints and reminders, particularly regarding fire safety. So much of what follows in this basic list is common sense and yet, we can become complacent; everything is fine – until it isn't. When it comes to fire, that can happen all too quickly.

Review, up-date, and practice your home's fire escape plan at least twice a year with all who need to know. The City of St. Albert has a comprehensive Emergency Preparedness plan on-line for you to print; it includes fire safety tips. Garage safety, including fire safety, will be included in the spring issue but many items here apply!

### Whole Home Checks



Take a walk around your home, inside and outside: garage, main floor and basement including any storage areas to ensure that:

- ✓ fire extinguishers are placed where recommended (near the furnace, fireplaces, in the garage and kitchen) and have not expired; fire blankets are an option to extinguishers; check out the many available on line
- ✓ all smoke and CO detectors are working; check detectors once a month and change batteries twice a year
- ✓ flammable materials are not positioned near any heat sources including: the main electrical junction box, electrical outlets, hot air vents, lamps/lights, fireplaces, space heaters, the furnace, the hot water heater, the barbecue (need we add open flames!)
- ✓ all appliances, electrical cords, plugs and receptacles are in good repair and proper working order
- ✓ plugs are fully inserted in receptacles,
- ✓ use a power bar rather than overloading one outlet
- all batteries are removed from items not in use and are stored safely; refer to manufacturers' instructions for storage re: battery operated tools, lights, bicycles

- ✓ small batteries (e.g. AA, AAA, D) are stored safely – preferably in their original packaging so that terminals are not in contact with other batteries or metal objects
- ✓ any flammable liquids/aerosols should be stored in fit-for-purpose containers in the garage
- ✓ have any natural gas appliances cleaned and checked once a year
- ✓ store any gas powered items properly, even small ones (e.g. barbecue lighters)
- ✓ keep a pair of fire retardant/heat resistant gloves near any heat sources
- keep a small sand box handy (away from any flammable materials) to act as an ashtray

### In The Kitchen



This is the place in our homes where fires most often start and quickly spread due to the close proximity of so many flammable items – and their frequent use. Keep in mind that it's important to:

- know how to use your all your appliances (big and small) safely, by reading the manual; e.g.: many new stoves have surface areas that can heat rapidly to very high temperatures
- ✓ some new stoves with a touch pad control panel have a "lock-out" function that disables heating so an inadvertent touch doesn't activate any features
- "turn it off before you turn away" any time you're cooking but especially when oils are used
- ✓ get the gloves out so many kinds of heat resistant gloves are available
- keep a metal pot lid nearby to quickly cover a flare-up
- ✓ check that you have an up-to-date kitchen fire extinguisher close by
- ✓ think about "fire blankets" as an option to extinguishers; very easy to use and quickly smother small fires; many types of fire blankets available online
- ✓ if the fire is oil/fat based and a lid is not handy use baking soda to extinguish it
- know that when there's an oven fire: don't open the door; oxygen will just add more fuel to the fire and may cause a sudden flare-up; immediately turn of the heat AND CALL THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

**Other Rooms** 

A few precautions to keep in mind:

- When using an electric blanket or heating pad, check that heating elements are encased in fireproof covering of the correct thickness, that the control switch is within reach, that a CSA label is attached to it and don't use an extension cord as it can cause overheating.
- Take care when using computers, tablets, phones in bed or on any upholstered surface as they may overheat and don't leave these items unattended; only use chargers on a heat resistant surface.
- Give any small appliances, such as clothing irons, blow dryers, curling irons, time to cool down before storing.
- Check that charging stations for any small appliances (e.g. electric shavers) are set on heat resistant surfaces.
- Use battery operated or electric candles which are so much safer!

AND FINALLY: While we all know about calling 911 in an emergency, there are several numbers listed for fire prevention and non-emergency fire services listed in the City of St. Albert phone directory.

**Fire Prevention Week** is from October14 – 18 this year. On Saturday, October 8, the St. Albert Fire Service is hosting an open house at Fire Hall #1, 20 Gate Avenue, from 11:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. You'll be able to chat with emergency services personnel and tour an ambulance/firetruck.
